Free Book Swap, Saturday, September 16, 10 am - 1 pm, Salem Senior Center - <u>5 Broad Street</u>


Don't miss SalemRecycles' semi-annual free bookswap and reusable bag exchange! Books for all ages! Books for all interests and genres! No "swap" needed!

Free Screening of Bag It -- Is Your Life Too Plastic?

"Thought provoking," "funny," "genuinely moving" are some of the ways this award-winning film has been described. In preparation for Salem's reusable bag initiative, which starts in January, come to this free screening to learn why this is so important.

Bag It follows 'everyman' Jeb Berrier as he navigates our plastic world. Jeb is



not a radical environmentalist, but an average American who decides to take a closer look at our cultural love affair with plastics.

Jeb's journey in this documentary film starts with simple questions: Are plastic bags really necessary? What are plastic bags made from? What happens to plastic bags after they are discarded? What he learns quickly

grows far beyond plastic bags.

How's Your Recycling IQ?

Each month we'll share some interesting recycling information along with common myths.

Myth: Recycling is more expensive than disposing of waste as trash; transporting recyclables so they can be processed into new materials wastes more energy than is saved by recycling.

The Truth: Salem currently pays about \$75 per ton for trash disposal. Salem currently earns about \$5 per ton for recycled materials! (August 2017). Excellent net gain, don't you agree?

According to Waste Management, the company that picks up Salem's recycling, the energy saved by creating new products from recycled materials offsets the energy used to transport and process these materials.
