



It's Time for the 5 Rs--Moving Beyond Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

First, Rethink – Much of our consumerism has been brought to a screeching halt, so it's a good time to rethink what we buy, how we use it and how we dispose of it. Becoming self-aware of our habits is the first step towards changing to a more sustainable and eco-friendly lifestyle.

- Two liter plastic bottles can be easily made into protective face shields! No special tools needed. Here's a link complete with a video.)



PPE -- What Goes Where?

This just in from Recycle Smart MA...

Are you using more disinfecting wipes than usual or making your way through hand sanitizer at an unprecedented speed? Here's a quick guide on how to properly dispose of items you may be using to protect yourself and your family:

- \Box Face mask Put this item in your trash bin.
- <u>Hand sanitizer bottles</u> Put empty and rinsed bottle in the recycling. If there is a cap, replace the cap before putting in the recycling. If there is a pump, put pump in the trash.
- Sanitizing wipes Put this item in your trash bin. Remember: Never flush wipes. Even if they are labeled "flushable." Wipes clog up sewer and septic systems.
- Disinfectant Wipes Plastic Canister Put this item in your recycling bin. Soft flexible wipe containers should go in the trash.
- Rubber gloves Put these in your trash bin.
- Plastic gloves Put these in your trash bin.

Did You Know? Tissues, paper towels and paper napkins, must NOT go in the recycling bin. The fibers in these paper items are too short to be used again. Please put these items in the trash.
